HALF MOON OVER THE HUDSON- 2009 CENTRAL ATLANTIC REGIONAL CONFERENCE

We have been excited to plan this conference during an auspicious time commemorating the 400th anniversary of Henry Hudson's sail of the 80 ton ship, Half Moon. This was a voyage that truly changed the world.

In 1609, while searching for the fabled Northwest Passage, Henry Hudson explored the majestic river which later would be named for him and began the New Netherlands settlements in the Hudson Valley.

Our conference (October 30-November 1), is held during a beautiful time of year for the area. We expect sunny days, with mild temperatures and glorious golds and reds covering the trees of the Hudson Highlands.

On Friday, our welcome hospitality includes a Standard Youth Flower Show titled: "O' Henry". Saturday tours feature an artistic tour

of the Hudson River Museum with a special exhibit on "Dutch New York".

There will be a private tour of the Glenview Manor House, with six period rooms, followed by lunch and a tour of the Castle on the Hudson in Tarrytown.

The second tour option is a visit to Kykuit, the 40 room mansion and gardens of the Rockefeller estate. Also included in this tour is a trip to Union Church in the legendary Sleepy Hollow. The church features Chagall windows and a Rose Window by Matisse. The enthralling story of the windows is about the relationship between distinguished patrons and collectors of modern art, two great 20th century artists, and the leading art connoisseurs and tastemakers of the day.

For Kykuit visitors, a tour of the church enhances their knowledge of the Rockefeller legacy. All who visit the Union church enjoy a unique and surprising aesthetic and spiritual experience.

The third tour is our "spouses tour", but all are welcome and space is limited. We will travel to the West Point Military Academy and lunch at the Thayer Hotel on the campus. The student body, or corps of cadets, numbers 4,400 and

each year, 1000 cadets join the "Long Grey Line" to graduate and be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. army.

In the evening following the tours, we will have a reception to meet NGC and CAR officers, and dinner at a Masquerade banquet. Our guest speaker is Clara Lou Gould, former mayor of Beacon, New York. She is a past director of District 3 of the Federated Garden Clubs of New York and is also serving as the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain Quadricentennial Commission Chair for New York State.

Our conference day Sunday, will start with the annual Central Atlantic Meeting. There we will acknowledge national and regional award recipients and hear of the accomplishments and aims of our region under the new director's theme of "because of you and what you do-make our world a better place".

Our luncheon will feature a world-renowned designer and horticulturist, Marigold Harding. She is a national board member representing the English-speaking affiliates, and is from Jamaica. Her designs will delight us, inspired by the theme, "As the River Flows."

Following the luncheon, our speakers will continue to

express our theme along the Hudson.

Eugene Boesch will discuss the archeology of the Hudson River. Raymond Phillips will give an historic account of the Replica of the Half Moon. Charles Bonnes will talk on Analyzing the Designed Landscape, with historic reference to the English and Dutch gardens of the Hudson River Valley.

Our evening entertainment will be the "Hudson Belles", a women's chorale, who will delight us in song, and let us unwind from a busy two days. The evening will conclude with a get-together preview party hosted by the Garden Club of New Jersey, Inc.

ARBORICULTURE-NEW CULTIVARS-TREES BY GOTTI KELLEY, GARDEN CLUB OF NEW JERSEY

Three exciting new cultivars will be seen in the Garden Centers in Spring 2010 and might just become great favorites:

Malus 'Bailears' (PFAF) *Ruby Tears* is a graceful, arching Crabapple tree with season-long interest, all packed into 8-10 feet. The naturally weeping branches are loaded with pink blossoms in the spring, and burgundy foliage provides interesting color all season long. It requires full sun.

Quercus ellipsoidalis 'Bailskies' Majestic Skies, brings straighter branching, a more symmetrical shape, and substantial foliage to the Northern Pin Oak variety.

It's even form and dense, glossy, dark green leaves make it a great shade tree choice. Pin oaks are known for their stunning red fall color and this tree puts on a great show. Height 60 feet, spread, 45 feet, full sun.

If you are looking for soothing shade through the summer, *Acer x freemanii*, 'Bailston', a *Matador Maple*, should be your choice. This new season-extending tree changes into its fall color a little later than some other maples. The deep orange-red color is stronger and more consistent than those of the same species. It is an excellent tree, perfect for any garden or park area. Height 45 feet, spread, 20-40 feet with upright, oval shape, full sun.

BOOK REVIEW

The Brother Gardeners: Botany, Empire and the Birth of an Obsession by Andrea Wulf

Alfred A. Knopf; first United States Edition, copyright 2008, 245 pages.

In 1716, a nurseryman named Thomas Fairchild delicately ran a feather tip across a Sweet William stamen, and transferred the dust onto the stigma of a carnation. When the seeds

matured and were planted, the result was a pink, double blossom of the carnation, and the clustering flower heads of the Sweet William. Rather than feeling elation and satisfaction over his discovery, Thomas Fairchild, a devout Christian, was riddled with anxiety and guilt over his transgression against the laws of nature. He never revealed to anyone what he had done.

This simple plant was the first man-made hybrid, and fortuitously occurred just at the time that interest in gardening was increasing.

The men featured in this book lived during the period known as the Enlightenment. They revolutionized horticulture and the drab English landscape changed forever. Up to this point, planting was limited to what was available in England at the time-and it wasn't much.

The new Fairchild hybrid stirred the imagination of gardeners, and the story begins when two boxes of seeds, a few plants, and two robust cuttings of *Kalmia* from America were delivered to the cloth merchant Peter Collinson.

He was so excited by what he had received, that he was transformed from gentleman gardener to an obsessive plant collector. He

prevailed on his American trading partners to send him more of the unknown but exciting plants. Thus he was introduced to an American farmer named John Bartram. The two men never met each other in person, but they corresponded over several decades, and their friendship grew as Collinson ordered and John Bartram supplied American plants. Collinson's garden gained notoriety for its unfamiliar American plants and botanists, horticulturists and tourists visited his garden to see these wonders. One of these visitors was Philip Miller, the head gardener for the Chelsea Physic Garden, who wrote the book, "The Gardeners Dictionary."

It was the first systematic, comprehensive book on practical gardening and when revised it incorporated the new American plants studied in Collinson's garden.

It quickly became a best seller and also established itself as the foundation of modern horticulture, for it made gardening possible for anyone. It included everything about how and where to plant each plant listed.

Miller too, became a customer of John Bartram. Peter Collinson had by this time become an agent for John Bartram and helped

him procure quite a few English customers. The American plants were so sensational that Carl Linnaeus travelled from Sweden to England to tour gardens and to bring specimen plants back to Sweden. Linnaeus himself had simplified plant classification. He wrote the revolutionary book "Systema Naturae", categorizing plants by a sexual system based on the number of male organs or stamens, and the female organs (pistils), at the center of each flower. This classification was so shocking, the book was banned by the Vatican, and rejected by the English, who preferred the Ray/de Tournefort classification method.

A defeated Linnaeus returned to Sweden and a few years later became a professor at the University of Uppsala. There he had a student, Daniel Solander, who quickly became his favorite. Linnaeus sent Solander to England to promote his classification system. Solander was such a delightful young man, who charmed everyone, that Collinson and others convinced him to stay in England, which he did. He gradually severed his relationship with Linnaeus and he did not immediately succeed in persuading

the English to accept the Linnaeus classification system. Solander did however, befriend Joseph Banks, a wealthy young gentleman with a strong interest in Botany, who convinced him to take a voyage around the world to study and gather new plants. Banks paid for this voyage, commissioning Captain Cook's Endeavor.

This book has everything. Adventure: It details Bartram's exploration for plants, and the difficulty of shipping living plants to England on voyages that lasted six or more weeks.

The voyage of Banks and Solander covered the hardships they endured and the dangers they encountered; the diseases they suffered, and finally their return to England three years after their journey began. It was noted that they were the first foreigners to set foot on Australian soil. This continent was rumored to exist and, once on land, Banks and Solander found some of the most exotic plants they had ever seen. Banks sponsored another voyage to Australia to collect plants. He hired Captain Bligh and his ship the Bounty for the voyage. The story of the famous mutiny on the Bounty is included in the final chapters.

This is the story of six

men, all obsessive plant collectors, and their connection with each other. The reader learns about their lives, their characters, and many surprising details generally unknown. The book is well worth reading for it is well written, very compelling, and hard to put down.

EXCITING NEWS!

"Beautify Blight" has received a monetary contribution for Awards to be given to the individual Regions. The idea is to promote community "vegetable" gardens throughout our eight (8) Regions and the International Affiliates, which will be counted as one additional Region.

We hope this small incentive will encourage more clubs to participate within their communities. With more community gardens, perhaps the monetary contributions will also grow.

The award money will be divided between two (2) categories.

CATEGORY 1. "Beautify Blight" a three (3) member team composed of a garden club, sponsored organization, and a sponsored organized youth group establishing a community vegetable garden on an unsightly piece of land. The objective is to supply a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.

BOOK OF EVIDENCE REQUIREMENTS: a BEFORE AND AFTER SET OF PHOTOS, ONE (1) OR TWO (2) PAGE DESCRIPTION OF THE PROJECT AND THOSE INVOLVED; A STATEMENT ABOUT IT BEING A ONE (1) OR A TWO (2) YEAR ENDEAVOR.

AWARD: A 1st Place Award of \$50.00 will be given in each of nine (9) Regions if warranted; ribbons will be awarded to 2nd and 3rd place winners.

CATEGORY 2. Pre-Existing "Community Vegetable Gardens" The purpose of which has been to supply and provide for a homeless shelter, soup/church kitchen. This project has to have been in place for a MINIMUM of the last three (3) years.

AWARD: A 1st Place Award of \$35.00 will be given in each of the nine (9) Regions if warranted; ribbons will be awarded to 2nd and 3rd place winners.

Each Regional Chairperson or persons of "Beautify Blight...Love Is....Cultivating a Community Garden" will send no more than three (3) candidates for each category to the National Chairperson of "Beautify Blight", Jeanne T.
